

Editor's presentation

Kant's Transcendental Semantics makes available in English translation the most influential monograph on Kant published in Brazil. Zeljko Loparic interprets Kant's Critical Philosophy as a project in semantics, positing the conditions for the meaning and reference of terms used in scientific problemsolving. Among the top Kant scholars in Brazil, Loparic inspired de "Semantic School" of Brazilian Kant interpretation.

The series "Kantstudien-Ergänzungshefte" publishes outstanding monographs and edited volumes that investigate all aspects of Kant's philosophy, including its systematic relationship to other philosophical approaches, both past and present. Studies that appear in the series are distinguished by their innovative nature and ability to close lacunae in the research. In this way, the series is a venue for the latest findings in scholarship on Kant.



Professor Zeljko Loparic is probably the single most influential Brazilian interpreter of Kant and the only one to have inspired a distinctive school of interpretation. His book *A Semântica Transcendental de Kant* presents his interpretation of Kant's critical philosophy as project in semantics, positing the conditions for the meaning and reference of terms. When Kant asks "how are synthetic a priori judgements possible?", his answer provides the possible reference and meaning conditions for the theoretical claims of the understanding and reason. No particular metaphysics is implied and no strict epistemic theory implicated in stressing the semantic problem and its solution. Loparic covers the entirety of the *Critique of Pure Reason* to cover philosophical, mathematical, and empirical judgments related to the physical sciences. Other work done by Loparic and his students extended this analysis to other issues such as ethical, historical, anthropological, and political judgments. Loparic's word has influenced Kant studies in Brazil for decades. Indeed if any particular novel approach to Kant studies can be associated with Brazil, it would be the "Semantic School" of Loparic-inspired work done by many across the country. Translation of this book into English now makes the essential text of that School available to the Kant community worldwide.
